Good morning everyone, and a very warm welcome to our service today. Today is DV Sunday, a day when Anglican churches across the country take time to remember that God wants every person, home and community to be safe, loving, and kind. Sadly, not everyone experiences that — but we believe that Jesus calls us to be a Church that sees and cares for people who are hurting, and that models the kind of respect for all people that can build a safe, respectful and flourishing community.

In our Bible reading today, Jesus tells us why he came — to bring good news to the poor, to help people who are sad or hurting, and to bring hope and healing wherever there is pain.

So, whether today you have come to our service full of joy or are carrying unseen suffering, you are welcome here. We are all part of God's big family — and today, we ask Jesus to help us be a church that shares his hope and light with everyone.

As we reflect on this let us pray

God of justice and compassion, your Son came among us to proclaim good news to the poor, release to the captives, and healing for the broken. On this DV Sunday, we remember those whose lives have been touched by violence, and we ask you to shine your light into every place of fear, to strengthen your Church to be a refuge, and to anoint us anew to follow Christ in his mission of healing and hope. Comfort those who are afflicted, strengthen those who speak out, and stir us, your Church, to be a place of hope, justice, and light. By your Spirit, renew us in your love, for the healing of our communities and the glory of your name. Through Jesus Christ our Lord. Amen.

THE MINISTRY OF THE WORD

The Sermon – The Reverend Grant Sparks

Let us affirm the faith of the Church

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Cathedral Prayer


